FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE TIP

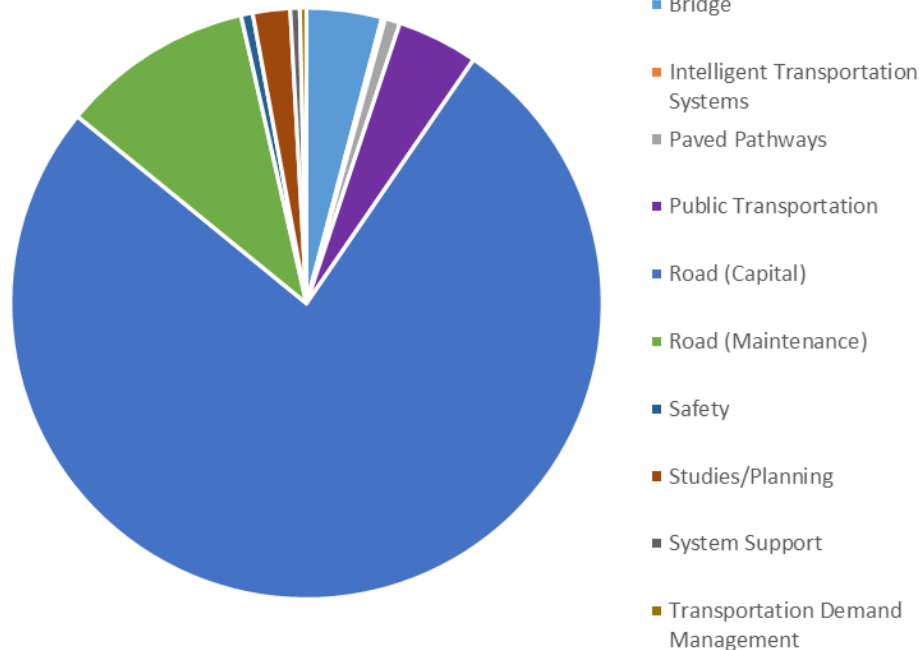
WHAT SPECIFIC PROJECTS ARE INCLUDED IN THE TIP?

- There are about 200 projects in the TIP, including:
- Constructing a new portion of State Highway 16 from US 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard) to Interstate 84.
 - Installing security cameras at four park-and-ride lots in Ada County.
 - Widening portions of US 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard), Eagle Road, Ustick Road, Franklin Road, Lake Hazel Road, Fairview Avenue, and more.
 - Constructing a bicycle and pedestrian bridge over the north channel of the Boise River in the City of Eagle.
 - Replacing a six-legged intersection with a roundabout at State Highway 19 (Simplot Boulevard) and Centennial Way/Cleveland Boulevard/Blaine Street in the City of Caldwell.
 - Replacing the Five Mile Road overpass over Interstate 84 in the City of Boise.

WHAT ABOUT THE REST OF THE STATE?

The Idaho Transportation Department develops a similar document called the Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP). The ITIP includes transportation projects across the state that are proposed for state or federal funding; it covers seven years of transportation budgeting and is updated annually. Projects in Ada and Canyon Counties must be approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors before projects are included in the ITIP.

WHAT IS THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)?

The TIP is a multi-year budget of federally funded, state funded, and “regionally significant” transportation projects in Ada and Canyon Counties. Essentially, it is a list of transportation projects with information on the project budgets. (A “regionally significant” project has a specific definition, but in general terms, it is what it sounds like... a project that is large enough to be significant to the region.) The TIP is updated annually and is based on the federal fiscal year, which runs from October 1 — September 30.

Projects in the TIP must be consistent with the regional long-range transportation plan. This plan, *Communities in Motion*, identifies transportation improvements needed over the next 20-30 years.

Who prepares the TIP?

COMPASS, the metropolitan planning organization for Ada and Canyon Counties, prepares and adopts the TIP annually in cooperation with the Idaho Transportation Department, local highway districts, local governments, Valley Regional Transit, and other project sponsors.
